Recap

Summary of 1 Peter 3:18-22

1 Peter 3:18-22 provides a profound exploration of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection, connecting these events to the believer's experience of baptism and the assurance of salvation. Peter emphasizes that Christ died "once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous," highlighting His sacrificial death and victorious resurrection. This passage then links Noah's ark and the saving of his family through water to baptism, which now saves believers—not as a removal of dirt from the body but as an appeal to God for a good conscience through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The text concludes by affirming Christ's ascension into heaven and His dominion over angels, authorities, and powers. This passage underscores the comprehensive victory of Christ over spiritual forces and the significance of baptism as both a symbol and a declaration of faith.

- **Genesis 6:1-8:** This passage describes the wickedness of humanity that led to God's decision to bring the flood.
- **2 Peter 2:4-5:** Peter speaks of God not sparing angels when they sinned but sending them to Tartarus (hell), and saving Noah, a preacher of righteousness, during the flood. This provides context for understanding the reference to spirits and God's judgment.
