

Sermon Discussion Guide

Proverbs 28:13 – “The Door To Mercy”

Preaching Date: November 16, 2025

Opening Prayer

Thank God for His mercy and faithfulness. Praise Him for providing a way of restoration through confession and repentance. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal hidden sins, to grant you godly sorrow, and to lead you into the joy and freedom of repentance through Christ.

Recap

Proverbs 28:13 draws a sharp contrast between concealing sin and confessing it. The one who hides his transgressions will not prosper—his efforts at covering up guilt only lead to spiritual dryness, stagnation, and divine resistance. But the one who confesses and forsakes sin will receive mercy. This verse captures both a warning and a promise. Hiding sin is a form of unbelief—it avoids the light of God’s truth. But confession is an act of faith that throws itself on the mercy of God, trusting in His character and His provision of forgiveness through Christ. This sermon exposed five common ways we try to conceal our sin—minimizing, blaming, hiding behind religion, delaying repentance, and ignoring conviction—and called us to the joy of walking in the light.

Understanding the Text

- 1. What is the main contrast in this verse?**
What do the words “conceals” and “confesses” imply about how we respond to sin?
- 2. Why does the one who hides sin not prosper?**
- 3. What does it mean to “forsake” sin? Why is confession incomplete without repentance?**
- 4. How does this verse help clarify the difference between worldly sorrow and godly sorrow (cf. 2 Corinthians 7:10)?**

Personal Reflection & Application

- 1. Of the five ways to conceal sin discussed in the sermon (minimizing, blaming others, hiding behind religion, delaying repentance, and ignoring**

conviction), which are you most prone to?

2. Why is it so hard to bring sin into the light?

What lies or fears often keep us silent when we should confess?

3. What are some practical ways we can build habits of confession and repentance in daily life?

4. How does the gospel give us confidence to confess rather than conceal?

5. What are the blessings of walking in the light (cf. 1 John 1:5–9)?

Have you experienced any of those blessings after honest confession?

6. How might regular confession strengthen relationships within the church and in your home?
